A SUBURB GEM

Our house? What do you mean, our house? Where?

We're talking about Fellowship House – a small 1950s community building, hidden behind a hedge on Willifield Green in the north-west corner of the Suburb. A main hall seats 60, a smaller room 10. There's a kitchen, reception area, loos etc, a garden and a magnificent croquet lawn.

Our chance?

A large bequest has enabled an updating project. We now need everyone to dig deep to ensure that a quality job can be done. It's a one-off opportunity.

So what is Fellowship?

It's a 100 year old Suburb charity providing activities and facilities for residents over 60. They are the main users of the building, but a lot happens there to which non-members of all ages are welcome, for example the Tuesday afternoon lectures.

But I'm 35, why should I be interested?

Maybe you have older relatives. One day you'll be 60 too! You may wish to attend events which are open to all, or which are run by other groups – or hire one of the spaces for a private function. The Suburb's strong sense of community is clear to all who live here. Surely a must-have for a community is a viable, up-to-date community building?

Who owns the building – churches, synagogues? The Trust, the Residents Association? Barnet?

None of the above. It's completely independent and secular. The long lease is owned by Fellowship, a body run by local Trustees.

What other independent community buildings are there in the Suburb?

After the recent sale of the Tea House for conversion to a private dwelling, all similar indoor spaces are owned by religious or other institutions or sports clubs. Fellowship House is, therefore, unique.





What work is going to be done?

The building will be brought up to modern-day standards and slightly expanded to bring the hall's capacity to 80+ and the smaller room to 25+. Details to the right.

How much money needs to be raised?

£50,000 to do a good job. Some Fellowship funding can be added to the bequest amount but this really must be minimised to keep the finances robust in the face of increasing running costs.






